Writing in these books, each assembled a prolonged series of observations laden with fear and hatred of women. Combining ignorance with myth and misogyny, Byrd’s and Jefferson’s books reveal their deep ambivalence about women, telling of women’s lascivious nature and *The Female Creed* and invoking the fallible, repulsive, and implicitly corruptible female body as a central metaphor for all tales of social and political corruption.
