**Exploring the World of Elephants** Aug 25 2020 The ancestors of the elephant once roamed across much of the planet, but today, only two species survive: the African elephant and the Asian elephant. Elephants are killed, on average, every 15–20 minutes – a situation that will see the final demise of these intelligent, extraordinary animals in less than three decades. They are a species in crisis.
